The sec 3 EL team of teachers acknowledged that weaving in the session and competition into our sec 3 EL curriculum is indeed beneficial. It very neatly ties in with one of our CCE themes - Elderly and also lessons on how to write an email. Students can also feel the impact of the competition because they understand its relevance.

Live On Festival (LOF) is organised by the National Organ Transplant Unit (NOTU), Ministry of Health. NOTU oversees both living donor and deceased donor organ transplants and plays a leading role in organising public campaigns and events to raise awareness on organ donation.

OBJECTIVES

LOF celebrates having participants, youths in particular, to express their thoughts on organ donation and transplantation through art and writing. LOF serves as a platform for exploring values of responsibility, compassion and empathy through the delicate and emotive nature of the topic of organ donation and transplantation.

The featuring of organ donation and transplantation also exposes participants to a relatively new topic, integrating lessons on altruism with medical and scientific advancement in the field of organ transplantation. Participants will be able to gain insights on the delicate and emotive nature of organ donation and transplantation.

IMPLEMENTATION

Teachers can choose from the essay and/or design competition for the students to participate in. The competition can be tailored and targeted towards specific groups of students (e.g. lower secondary or upper secondary students) in the upcoming academic year. NOTU will provide a 45-minute interactive sharing session (during CCE, English, Art, Science lessons, assembly or CCA session) with the students to provide them with information on the topic of organ donation and transplantation.


